



AVIAN REGULATIONS OVERVIEW



- On February 21, 2024, the United States
 Department of Agriculture's (USDA)
 regulations setting new welfare standards
 for birds not bred for research took effect.
- If you are involved in selling, exhibiting, transporting, or using birds for research, you may need to be licensed or registered under the Animal Welfare Act (AWA) by the USDA.

INSPECTIONS

- USDA inspectors will conduct unannounced visits to licensed or registered facilities to review all areas of care and treatment covered under the law.

- The regulations include de minimis exemptions, such as:
 - Entities that sell 200 or fewer pet birds weighing 250 grams or less each year, and/or sell eight or fewer pet birds of more than 250 grams annually.
 - Please use the USDA Animal Care Licensing and Registration Assistant to determine whether you need a license or registration.

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- The new regulations requirements will affect:
 - Housing facilities
 - Animal health and husbandry
 - Transportation

IMPORTANT NOTE TO BREEDERS – FORMAL GUIDANCE FROM USDA

- If you applied more than 90 days before the February 21, 2024 deadline, you are permitted to continue regulated activities while awaiting inspection. You also should have received a letter from the USDA confirming application submission.
- If you applied less than 90 days before the February 21, 2024 deadline, you must suspend regulated activities until inspected and licensed.
- **EVERYONE is still able to sell birds up to the de minimis threshold while waiting. The de minimis numbers are based on sales in a calendar year.
