

Amends Title 4 (Animals & Animal Husbandry), Chapter 1 (Cruelty to Animals), Section 4-1-26 (Abandonment of Animals) of RI General Laws to provide that the trapping and subsequent release of any unowned feral or free roaming cat for the purpose of spaying or neutering of the cat would not be considered abandonment. Provides that it shall not be considered abandonment, and the provisions of of this section and of § 4-24-8 (Abandonment of Cats) shall not apply to any person who traps unowned feral or free roaming cats, causes those cats to be spayed or neutered, and subsequently releases those cats, provided: (1) Any medical or surgical procedures performed on those cats are performed by a licensed veterinarian; and (2) The cats are returned to the property where they were trapped.

Adds to the definition of "domestic violence": (1) Unnecessary cruelty to an animal owned or cared for by a household member (§ 4-1-3); (2) Malicious injury to or killing of an animal owned or cared for by a household member (§ 4-1-5); and (3) Abandonment of an animal owned or cared for by a household member (§ 4-1-26).

Amends Title 34 (Property), Chapter 34-37 (RI Fair Housing Practices Act), Sections 34-37-3 (Definitions) and 34-37-4 (Unlawful housing practices) of RI General Statutes to define "assistance animal" and clarify existing protections for persons with such animals consistent with the federal Fair Housing Act. Clarifies that very person with a disability who has an assistance animal, or who obtains an assistance animal, which may be necessary to afford that person an equal opportunity to use and enjoy a dwelling and which does not provide a direct threat to the health or safety of others, shall be entitled to full and equal access to all housing accommodations provided for in this section and shall not be required to pay extra compensation for the assistance animal but shall be liable for any damage done to the premises by an assistance animal. For purposes of this section: "Assistance animal" means an animal that has been determined to mitigate the effects of a physical or mental disability by a physician, psychologist, physician's assistant, nurse practitioner, other health care provider, vocational rehabilitation specialist or licensed social worker.

Amends Title 4 (Animals & Animal Husbandry), Chapter 13.1 (Regulation of Vicious Dogs), Section 4-13.1-5 (Harboring dogs for dog fighting - Training dogs to attack humans - Selling, breeding, or buying dogs) of Rhode Island General Laws to further provide for the seizure, disposition and cost of care of vicious dogs. Provides that when a municipality transfers a dog to the RISPCA, which dog was seized because the dog was harbored for fighting or trained to attack humans, the costs for the care of the dog would be initially paid by the municipality. Provides that the RISPCA would still be permitted to pursue a civil action for damages against the actual owner or guardian of the dog for these costs. Revises the procedure to be followed prior to humane euthanization of the dog.

This act would create a custody procedure for pets in divorce and separation proceedings based on the best interests of the animal. Provides that this act would not apply to assistance/service animals. For purposes of this section: "Companion animal" means a domesticated animal or pet and shall not include assistance animals (also called service animals), which are defined as any animal that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability including a physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability.

Amends Title 34 (Property), Chapter 37 (Rhode Island Fair Housing Practices Act), Sections 34-37-1 (Definitions) and 34-37-4 (Unlawful Housing Practices) of Rhode Island General Laws to define "assistance animal" and clarify existing protections for persons with such animals consistent with the federal Fair Housing Act. Provides that an owner may not refuse to make reasonable accommodations in rules, policies, practices, or services to allow a person with a disability who has a service animal or assistance animal or who obtains a service animal or assistance animal full and equal access to all housing accommodations provided for in this section, when those accommodations may be necessary to use and enjoy a housing accommodation. Provides that a person with a disability who has a service animal or assistance animal or who obtains a service animal or assistance animal shall not be required to pay a pet fee, pet deposit or other extra compensation, but shall be liable for any damages done to the premises by a service animal or assistance animal. Provides that, in determining whether a dog qualifies as a service animal, an owner shall not inquire into the nature or extent of a person's disability or require documentation, such as proof that the dog has been certified, trained, or licensed as a service animal. Unless it is readily apparent that the dog is trained to do work or perform tasks for an individual with a disability, an owner may ask if the animal is required because of a disability and what work or task the animal has been trained to perform. For purposes of this section: "Assistance animal" means an animal that has been determined to mitigate the effects of a physical or mental disability by a physician, psychologist, physician's assistant, nurse practitioner, other health care provider, vocational rehabilitation specialist, or licensed social worker. "Service animal" means a guide dog, hearing dog, or other dog that is specifically trained to assist a person with a disability to perform independent living tasks. The provision of emotional support, well-being, comfort, or companionship do not constitute work or tasks for the purposes of this definition.
